This is the last Will  
and Testament of me Richard Denyer of Liphook  
in the Parish of Bramshott in the County of Southampton  
Esq. as follows first I give and devise all that  
my freehold Tenement or Dwellinghouse known as the

Outlawed ffarm lands hereditaments and premises  
with their and every of their Appurtenances and premises  
containing together in the whole by estimation and  
forty acres (more or less) situate lying and being  
in the parish of Bramshot aforesaid and being  
the occupation of William Dora Esq<sup>r</sup> and now in  
or assigned unto my wife Elizabeth Demyer to  
hold unto my said wife and her assigns for  
and during the term of her natural life and  
then I give and devise the said Demyer to  
township or dwellinghouse Barne stable  
Outlawed ffarm lands hereditaments and  
appurtenances unto my son George Demyer  
Esq<sup>r</sup> Executor Administrator and  
assigns also I give and devise all those four  
Moorlands or townments or dwellinghouses  
and premises with their and every of their  
appurtenances situate lying and being in the  
parish of Bramshot aforesaid and being in the  
in the several tenures and now or late  
more James Byott Thomas Oates and Sarah  
Abbey unto my said wife and her assigns for  
and during the term of her natural life and  
then I give and devise the said last mentioned  
four Moorlands or townments or dwellinghouses  
and premises with their and every of their appurtenances  
unto my daughter Elizabeth Demyer Esq<sup>r</sup> and  
assigns for ever also I give and devise all  
those two Moorlands or townments or dwellinghouses  
and premises with their and every of their appurtenances  
belonging unto the said last mentioned  
parish of Bramshot aforesaid and being in the  
in the several tenures and now or late  
and Charles Boulton unto my said wife and  
her assigns for and during the term of  
her natural life and then I give and devise  
the said two Moorlands or townments or dwellinghouses  
and premises with their and every of their appurtenances  
unto my daughter Elizabeth Demyer Esq<sup>r</sup> and  
assigns for ever also I give and devise all that  
Moorland or townment or dwellinghouse Barne  
stable and out close of land and premises  
belonging and adjoining

in situation etc and by the same more or less / situate  
living and being in the parish of Braughston aforesaid  
and now in the occupation of John Sturt and am  
understande or assigne and also all those maner  
Outlawes Gardens hereditaments and premises  
with their and every of their appurtenances and situate  
situate living and being in the parish of Braughston  
aforesaid and now in my own possession and in the  
occupation of Susan Cooper and Joseph Dippin  
unto my said wife and her assigne for and during  
during the term of her natural life and from and  
and after the decease of my said wife then do  
give and devise the said Outlawes Gardens or  
dwelling house with their and every of their  
said hereditaments and premises in the maner  
occupation of the said John Sturt as also the  
said Outlawes Gardens hereditaments and premises  
with their and every of their appurtenances in  
my own possession and in the several occupations  
of the said Susan Cooper and Joseph Dippin  
unto my son William Dupper his heirs and an  
assigne for ever also I give and devise all that  
Outlawes Gardens hereditaments and premises  
with their and every of their appurtenances  
and being in the parish of Braughston aforesaid  
and now in the occupation of my son Francis  
Dupper unto my said wife for and during the  
term of her natural life and from and after the  
decease of my said wife then I give and devise  
the said last mentioned Outlawes Gardens  
hereditaments and premises with their and every  
of their appurtenances unto my said son Francis  
Dupper his heirs and assigne for ever also I give  
and devise unto my said daughter Elizabeth part  
the sum of one hundred pounds of lawful money  
of Great Britain to be paid unto her at and  
immediately after the decease of my said wife  
also I give and devise all the rest  
and remainder of my Estate and Estates  
both real and personal and of what nature  
kind or quality soever within the Kingdom of  
Great Britain or elsewhere unto my said wife  
Elizabeth Dupper her heirs Executors Assignes  
and assigne and lastly I do hereby make and  
constitute my said wife Elizabeth Dupper  
and sole executrix and sole administratrix  
of my will hereby vesting all my  
rights by me at any time heretofore made

Witness wherof the said Richard Dwyer the  
testator to this my will contained in two sheets  
of paper have set my hand and seal (that is to  
say) my hand to the first sheet and my seal to  
and seal to the second sheet and have published  
and declared the same to be my last will and  
testament the seventh day of June in the  
year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred  
and ninety three — Richard Dwyer  
Richard Dwyer the testator and for his last  
will and testament in the presence of us who  
in his presence at his request and in the presence  
of each other have subscribed our names as in  
witness thereto — Robert Moore — Tho. in

## This Will

was proved at London the  
twenty third day of February in the year of our  
Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety  
six before the Right Honourable Sir William  
Wyndham Knight Doctor of Laws Master Keeper  
and Companion of the Prerogative Court of Canterbury  
lawfully constituted by the Oath of Elizabeth  
Dwyer widow the wife of the deceased and sole  
executrix named in the will to whom power  
was granted of all and singular the goods  
chattels and credits of the deceased leaving  
been first sworn (by Oath) duly to Admin.
